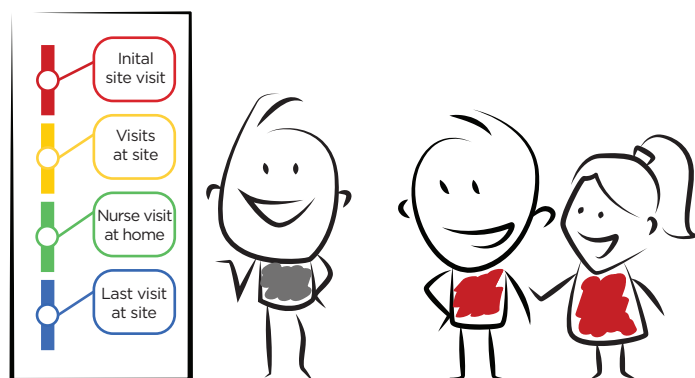


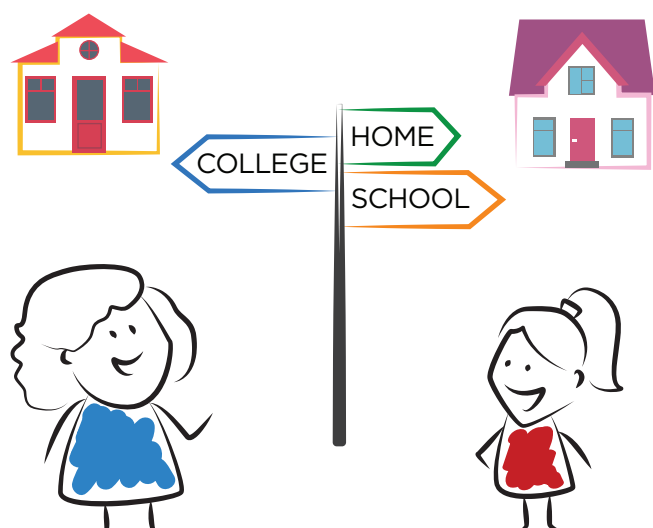
How Mobile Research Nursing Works



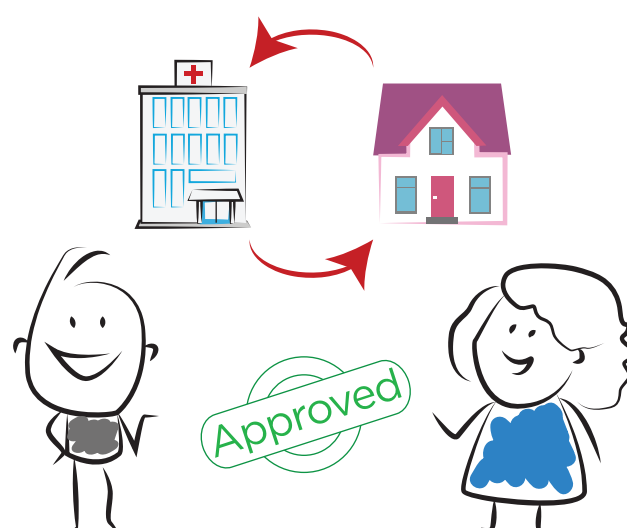
The option of off-site visits is introduced during the consent process, where with your caregiver, you can choose to use the service.



The nurse meets you and your family at the site to discuss arrangements for future visits and provide reassurance about the procedures.



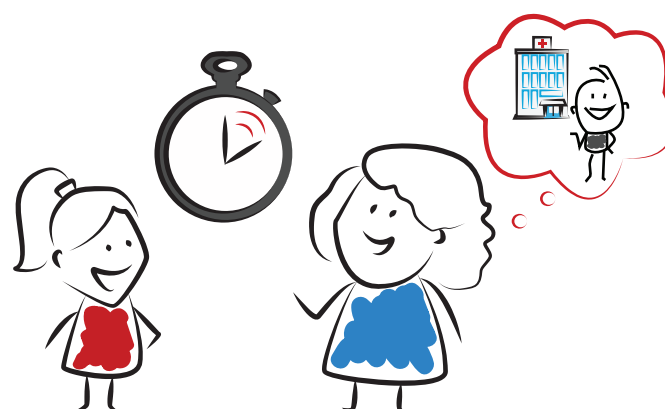
Visits can take place in any environment such as home, school or college. Where possible the same nurse will complete all your visits to help you both build a relationship.

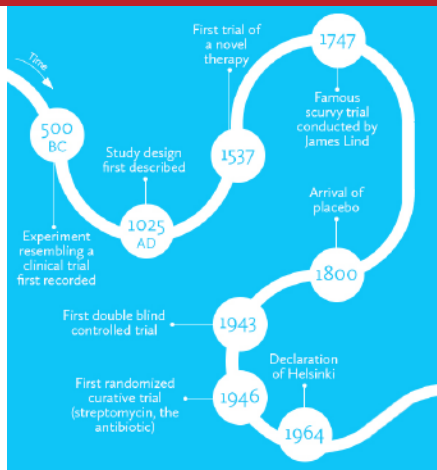


The Research Nurse handles all the visit requirements, such as talking to pharmacy and courier. Communication is vital between the Research Nurse, Project Manager and study site.

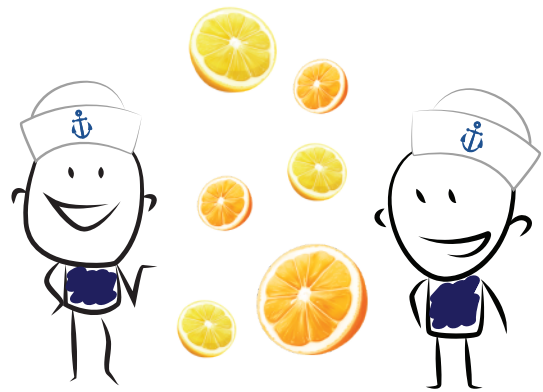


Your visit is conducted. The Research Nurse remains with you and your family for a set amount of time to monitor you. Serious adverse events are reported to the investigator immediately and action taken if needed.

Clinical trials are even recorded in the Bible in the Book of Daniel.



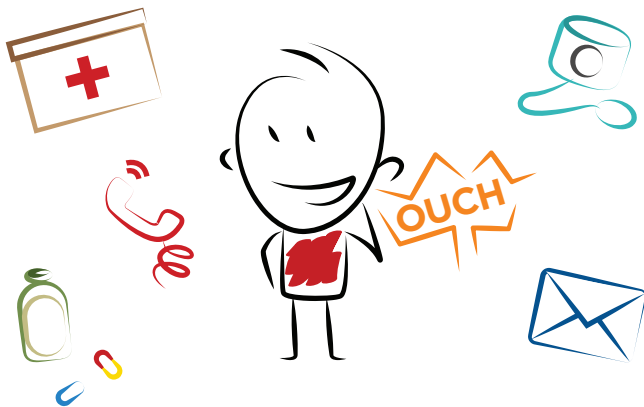
The first physician-conducted clinical trial happened over 250 years ago in 1747. James Lind was studying Scurvy on naval boats using oranges and lemons!



People as early as Sumerians and Egyptians have looked for medicine, back then they were using Willow in 3000BC.



May 20 is known as International Clinical Trials Day, because Lind's celebrated controlled trial began on that day in 1747.



Between 700 and 1000 clinical trials are conducted each year, that's just in studies surrounding pain relief.
